The Tyler School of Art, a top-ranked school, aspires to be among the world's truly great art and design schools. The strategic plan is the School's agenda to enhance our academic and artistic mission and elevate our stature as a world-class arts institution. This vision, both aspirational and affirmative, reflects the rich history of the School as part of Temple University and in the context of the dynamic and fluid global art world.

VISION

Since its establishment in the 1930s, the Tyler School of Art has been committed to progressive education, offering an environment for the advancement of the fine arts and design, scholarly study in the arts, and individual creativity. Over time, its emphasis on the students' mastery of technique within the framework of a liberal arts curriculum has evolved in response to evolving notions of art-making and the role of art in society. Today, in addition to traditional curricular areas, the departments, programs, and curricula at Tyler incorporate a wide range of studio art, design, art historical, and built environment practices.

Tyler saw growth and unification with the January 2009 move of the fine arts programs to new urban facilities on Temple University's main campus and the 2012 addition of the Architecture Building, bringing Tyler programs together at one site. In 2016, the addition of two departments – Landscape Architecture and Horticulture and Community and Regional Planning – created a new division of Architecture and Environmental Design. Tyler remains centered on Temple's main campus but now includes teaching and research activity at the Ambler campus, including the Ambler Arboretum. Tyler now finds itself ideally positioned to redefine art and design as a practice and study of critical cultural production. As such, art comprises images and objects, ideas and spaces that are both deeply embedded in and profoundly shaped by our shared environment. Promoting cultural production as an aesthetically and socially transformative practice, Tyler today reflects a re-imagining of the role of the art school in the 21st century.

- Strengthen Tyler's identity as a community of artists, designers, educators and researchers that have a shared vision as a preeminent, inclusive art and design school recognized for its contributions to the intellectual, social, artistic, and cultural vitality of the greater Philadelphia area, nation, and beyond.
